

SPRING IN THE GARDEN



Although London Terrace is in the heart of Manhattan, its acre of inclosed garden is receiving all the attention that is each year extended to the finest estates. The grass plots have been top-dressed and sown with new seed which is already beginning to appear above the ground. An innovation this year will be the addition of flower beds in the garden, a project which the Management had hesitated to start, but with the complete cooperation which has been extended by residents in keeping the garden so attractive, the four plots around the fountain have been prepared for planting with brightly colored flowers and borders of privet hedge. This same treatment will be carried out also in the two larger plots at each end of the garden in front of the Swimming Pool and Pierre's Restaurant. Serving as a background for these two plots will be shrubbery and flowering bushes consisting of Rose of Sharon with flowering pink and white blossoms, white Mock-Orange, Deutchia, Forsythia, and a small privet hedge in front.

Along the sides of the garden yellow Forsythia has been planted in clumps with hundreds of Rhododendrons from a private estate in Monticello set in the small plots near the walls.

In the garden patches on the outer walls of the buildings Rhododendrons will be planted on the 24th Street side and privet and fir on the 23rd Street side, with newly planted tall privet and firs on either side of each doorway entrance. With our beautiful swan fountain setting off this array of flowers and shrubbery, the garden of London Terrace will be as delightful as any in New York.

Post Office Petition Goes to Washington

THE London Terrace Post Office petition and that of the Twenty-third Street Association combined were taken to Washington on Tuesday, May 1, by William E. Barton, Manager of London Terrace, representing both organizations, to be presented to Postmaster General James A. Farley through Congressman John J. Boylan, who represents the Third District. The response of residents of

London Terrace to the petition was practically unanimous, and as the great majority of business houses and residents in the Twenty-third Street area also signed the petition, a bulky and imposing bound book is now in the Capitol bearing the hopes of thousands of persons for a nearby Post Office which will be of great convenience to all of us. We wish to extend the thanks of the Management for the immediate cooperation of our residents which made this effort on our part possible. 

S. S. LONDON TERRACE READY FOR SEA




The Marine Deck has had its annual overhauling, complete with new paint, finish and repairs, and is now ready for her third summer voyage with the residents of London Terrace. The Management takes great pride in this unique apartment house attraction and has done everything possible to make it an ideal spot for open air enjoyment. New chairs have been ordered for use on the east wing of the roof in the evening, in the space occupied by the children's play roof during the day to accommodate the larger number of persons who are expected to use the roof this summer at night. A drinking fountain has been installed at the head of the gangway leading to the deck, new flags are flying and new travel posters from foreign ports will shortly adorn the "dock" alongside which the ship is moored, pending her departures on her daily imaginary voyages.

Successful Experiment

The Marine Deck was started as an experiment which has proved highly successful, and now that its third season is beginning, the Management wishes to bring to the attention of residents the various problems which arose from time to time during the earlier days. Considering

only the comfort, safety and convenience of the majority of the thousands of people who visit the Deck each summer, we have found that certain "shipboard" regulations most effectively contribute to the ideal of comfort we have attained. It is therefore with no idea of prohibiting the full enjoyment of the Deck's facilities that the Management for the first time, publishes the regulations that have been found by experiment to be most help-



ful to the great majority of residents.

Mutually Cooperative

The Marine Deck, since it is the one place in London Terrace where large numbers of persons congregate for rest and relaxation, is, in effect, a mutually cooperative spot by itself, remote from all other parts of the buildings, and depending for its success upon mutual consideration of all who make use of this facility. Below is the copy of the Marine Deck regulations which are now posted in the Penthouse Club and on the Deck for the guidance of all:

THE MARINE DECK REGULATIONS

The Marine Deck is open daily to adult residents and guests accompanying them from 9 a.m. until 11:00 p.m. for quiet rest and relaxation. Children under sixteen years of age are not permitted on the deck at any time, even when accompanied by adults. Non-residents are not permitted the use of the deck unless accompanied by residents; and all resident visitors must be prepared to show their identification cards upon request of the Club Manager or his assistants. Since the number of chairs on the deck is limited by the space available, residents are requested not to use them regularly for non-resident guests. Visitors may not reserve or otherwise hold chairs for later arrivals or temporary absentees.

Sun bathing in bathing suits is permitted for residents from 9:00 a.m. until noon each day and at no other time. Sun bathers must use the deck chairs, and not lie or otherwise recline on the deck itself. Dressing gowns or robes must be worn to and from apartments. After 12 o'clock noon, ordinary dress is required of all visitors. No pajamas, trousers, or bifurcated skirts may be worn by women after the noon hour.

No dogs, cats, or other pets are permitted on the deck at any time, nor may they be left in the Penthouse Club or hallways during visits to the deck.

No lunches or other refreshments of any kind are permitted to be brought or delivered to the Marine Deck.

There are no facilities for reception or delivery of telephone Messages to the Marine Deck.

Neither the Club Manager nor his assistants are permitted to perform services or execute errands for visitors.

In the interests of safety, visitors will not sit upon the parapet surrounding the deck.

The Marine Deck closes promptly at 11:00 p.m., and visitors are asked to leave the deck upon the striking of six bells. Entrance will be closed at 10:45 p.m. in order to prevent crowding and confusion on the stairway and in the elevator hallway in the Penthouse Club.

These regulations are posted for the information and guidance of residents. In formulating them, the Management has given careful consideration to the comfort, contentment and safety of all who are entitled to make use of this facility.

In the Swimming Pool

UNDER the supervision of Mr. Hulsmann the London Terrace Pool is expanding its activities, and Mr. Hulsmann is taking personal charge of swimming and diving instruction. The new Sun Room is now being installed and will be ready for use in about a week. Regular use of this facility will create an early season tan preliminary to week-end and vacation trips to the beaches, eliminating the usual few days of discomfort. During the hours Mr. Hulsmann is absent from the Pool, Mrs. Hulsmann is in charge of the activities and her pleasing personality has created a friendly cooperative spirit among the hundreds of residents who use the pool daily. Residents wishing to

arrange for swimming and diving lessons under the personal guidance of Mr. Hulsmann are asked to inquire for him at the pool office in the 470 building.

Penthouse Bridge

THE regular Monday Progressive and Thursday Duplicate Bridge Parties in the Penthouse Club are attracting more and more new players. They have been held each week for the last three years, and residents who have not yet attended them would, we feel sure, find these meetings of bridge players exceptionally interesting. Play starts promptly at 8:30 and notices are posted each week in the entrance lobbies of all build-ings.

SPRING HOUSECLEANING

Spring is here with its conflicting desire for a long cruise to far lands and the necessity for spring housecleaning meeting each other face to face. To enable our residents to give their entire time to planning their vacations while relaxing in a newly refurbished apartment, the Management takes this opportunity to present in concise form the many services offered which will make the spring cleaning a joy and a pleasure.

First is Maid Service, the standard rate for which is fifty cents an hour, but monthly rates are available for one-room apartments at ten dollars a month for one hour's work a day; and for two-room apartments a rate of fifteen dollars a month is obtainable for one and one-half hour's each day, with special service after 6 p.m. at fifty cents an hour, arrangements for which should be made before 9 a.m.

Window washing rates are 40¢ for double windows, 25¢ for single windows, and 15¢ for bathroom windows, and the service is especially fast and convenient.

Floor waxing and polishing is obtainable at a flat rate of 75¢ an hour with the same rate for waxing around large rugs; but inclusive rates are available at \$1.75 for one-room apartments, \$3.00 for two-room apartments, and \$4.50 for three-room apartments, with special rates for larger units.

All the above services may be obtained by calling the Housekeeper on the house telephone.

For wall washing calls should be made directly to the office of the Superintendent. Rates are 60¢ an hour, and the work is quickly and efficiently accomplished with a minimum of trouble and moving of furniture.

A study of the rates enumerated above will show that Spring

housecleaning in London Terrace apartments can be completely done at extremely moderate prices at a time when it is most convenient to the resident.

And so the conflict with spring fever and stern necessity is automatically eliminated.

Upholstering Service

STARTING on Monday, May 1, the Management of London Terrace inaugurated another new and especially advantageous service to residents. A skilled and experienced upholsterer, a Swiss craftsman from the old country, is now one of the large staff which renders essential domestic service to the apartments, and his services may be obtained by calling the office of the Superintendent. Rates will be found to be attractively low for all types of work, and the convenience and reliability of this service is expected to be of real assistance to residents especially at this season of the year.

B & O Bus Stops

THE Baltimore and Ohio Railway informs us that their busses carrying passengers to the railroad station in Jersey City will stop at the main entrance to London Terrace, 435 West 23rd Street if passengers departing by train will call the information office in advance. As some of the busses use the Liberty Street Ferry and do not pass the Terrace, arrangements may be made to board these busses at 8th Avenue and 23rd Street. Requests for information will be answered by calling Ashland 4-1602.

New Crest

Fourteen sand jars have recently been placed in the lower corridors, one between the elevators in each building, and every employee of the organization from the highest official down has pledged himself to see that the corridors are kept clean and bright. From the Rental Office

AS an indication of the signs of the times, confirmed by reports of the upward economic trend appearing regularly in the daily press, rents in London Terrace have been slightly increased, and with the probability of the imminent signing of the Apartment House Code, further increases may be anticipated before the new leasing season commences on the first of October.

Despite the new scale, however, the Renting Office which is now accepting renewals, is more than busy, and about twenty per cent of the residents have already renewed their leases for next year, a remarkable record for this early date. Classification of these early renewals reveals the gratifying fact that the majority represent residents who are now entering on their fourth year in London Terrace.

Three-Room Apartments

Inquiries continue regarding the three-room apartments with through ventilation, and the Rental Manager takes this opportunity to further suggest that as the warm summer is approaching others may wish to inspect these exceptionally cool and spacious apartments with a view to a transfer at this time. 7. Cordials
8. Champagne
(For gala occasions)

The favorite mixer is Ginger Ale with lime and lemon rickys second, and plain sparkling waters third. Royal Scarlet Liquor Store is the largest individual user of Ginger Ale in New York, handling 1,000 cases a month, helping us to forget that Prohibition was ever with us.

Swimming Meets for Children

THE children of London Terrace are forming a swimming club which holds regular aquatic meets every Friday afternoon at 4:30 o'clock. Practice sessions being held daily at 4:30 and on Saturday mornings. The club is under the personal direction of Mr. Hulsmann, proprietor of the London Terrace Pool, and Eddie Myers, professional swimmer, instructs the children in swimming, diving, racing, and the plunge. Their organization is known as Hulsmann's Terrace Club, and the entrance fee of 10 cents at each Friday meet is set aside for swimming emblems, medals and prizes for the winners in the various events. All children who can swim are eligible for membership.

Temple Meet, May 3

On Thursday evening, May 3, the Temple Athletic League is sponsoring the annual Boys' and Girls' Swimming Meet of the Reformed Temples in Manhattan. Five teams have been entered the events which include free style and back stroke swimming, diving, and relay races. There is no admission charge for spectators on the balcony.
